In the Photography Gallery



HOLLYWOOD PORTRAITS: through August 31. In the early days of Hollywood, studios began releasing photographs of their actors and actresses to newspapers and fan magazines in order to drum up interest in their most recent films. By the 1920s, the art of studio portraiture had reached a peak, as photographers (most of them anonymous) learned how to capture a performer's mysterious essence in a still image. As the star system burgeoned throughout the 1930s, '40s and '50s, hundreds of thousands of glossy portraits were printed and circulated. These images were not highly prized by the studios, and the stills were usually tossed. Fortunately, many images survive to evoke the glamourous world of mid-twentieth century Hollywood. Media Services director Jonathan Guildroy purchased his first movie stills around 1968, when his father brought him to a musty shop in New York City. That day he selected two images, a portrait of Boris Karloff in Bride of Frankenstein and a two-shot of Karloff and Bela Lugosi in Son of Frankenstein. Entranced by the silvery clarity of these images, Jonathan soon set about finding more. His collection of over 1700 stills now includes glamour portraits of Hollywood stars, numerous monsters and aliens, color reproductions of horror movie posters and lobby cards, and some sixty images from Planet of the Apes. This summer's exhibit will include portraits of Hollywood's greatest stars, including Fred Astaire, John Barrymore, James Cagney, Gary Cooper, Marlene Dietrich, Kirk Douglas, Clark Gable, Susan Hayward, Rita Hayworth, Charlton Heston, Buster Keaton, Veronica Lake, Charles Laughton, Dorothy Lamour, Jeanette MacDonald, Marilyn Monroe, Vincent Price, Ginger Rogers, James Stewart, Johnny Weissmuller and Orson Welles. Also on view, a selection from Jonathan's collection of movie star postcards!



# 19 WEDNESDAY

A BIRTHDAY TRIBUTE TO ALFRED HITCHCOCK: *Rear Window* (1954-115 min.). Laid up in his Greenwich Village apartment, photojournalist L.B. Jefferies (James Stewart) spies on his neighbors and soon suspects a traveling salesman (Raymond Burr) of killing his wife. Screenwriter John Michael Hayes adapted a Cornell Woolrich story. Grace Kelly, Wendell Corey and Thelma Ritter co-star. 7:30 p.m.

#### 20 THURSDAY

3rd THURSDAY @ 3: Two Belgian Modernists. Except for three years studying history and religious painting at the Brussels academy, James Ensor, a Belgian painter, printmaker and draftsman, lived in Ostend. He began his artistic career as a portrait painter but became involved with the avant-garde group Les XX (The Twenty), and was considered the group's leader and founder. In the mid-1880s, Ensor suffered from a personal crisis, returned to painting religious subjects and plunged to the depths of despair. After the turn of the century, he finally won acclaim and respectability. His works are featured in a show at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City, which runs through September 21. The work of Surrealist painter Rene Magritte (1898-1967) frequently displays a juxtaposition of ordinary objects in an unusual context. 3 p.m. AAC

DIRECTOR'S CUT: Film expert John Bosco will screen and discuss *Waltz with Bashir* (2008-90 min.). In this Oscar-nominated "animated documentary," Israeli writer/director Ari Folman meets up with former army comrades to discuss how war has affected their lives, and to puzzle out his own forgotten past. In Hebrew, German, English and Arabic, with English subtitles. 7:30 p.m.

SANDWICHED IN: Our birthday tribute to Alfred Hitchcock continues with *The Lodger: A Story of the London Fog* (1927-100 min.), in which the owners of a boarding house begin to suspect that their new tenant (Ivor Novello) is the serial killer known in the tabloids as The Avenger. Long available only in mediocre prints, we are pleased to screen this gorgeously restored version of the first really "Hitchcockian" thriller. Silent with musical score. 12:10 p.m.

"LAZYBONES' (1925-86 min.). Buck Jones stars as Steve Tuttle, a country lad "slow as molasses in winter" who nevertheless adopts an abandoned baby girl named Kit and raises her as his own. When he returns from World War I, he is unprepared to find Kit (Madge Bellamy) all grown up and in love with local boy Dick Ritchie (Leslie Fenton). Frances Marion scripted this moving comedy-drama, from a play by Owen Davis, for director Frank Borzage. Tim Curran composed the lovely flute/guitar/piano score. 7:30 p.m.

A BIRTHDAY TRIBUTE TO ALFRED HITCHCOCK: *Psycho* (1960-109 min.). Marion Crane (Janet Leigh) steals money and runs away to a desolate hotel run by mother-fixated taxidermist Norman Bates (Anthony Perkins). Joseph Stefano scripted, from Robert Bloch's novel. Vera Miles, John Gavin and Martin Balsam costar in this influential low-budget shocker. 7:30 p.m.
