CAROL FROEHLIG: TO AIR IS HUMAN, March 5 through April 30. "The sky's the limit" is an expression that Glen Head resident Carol Froehlig takes very seriously. She is a pilot, having started flying several years before retiring as a teacher in the North Shore School District. In 2007, she reinvented herself by starting her own aerial photography company, Sky Aerial Images, Inc. She is the president, aerial photographer and pilot, all in one. Her exhibition consists of 20 aerial photos showing sites around Long Island, including the Captree Lighthouse on Fire Island, Montauk Lighthouse, sunsets over the Great South Bay, and local points in Port Washington. Carol shoots with a Nikon D200 from an altitude of 1000 feet, and usually has another pilot handle the plane while she perches halfway out the window of her Cessna 172. This is how she is able to capture that "bird's eye view" that shows the "big picture." Carol is also a Long Island aviation historian who has created seven presentations, including "Those Daring Young Women and Their Flying Machines," which she will show here at Sandwiched In on Friday, March 6 at 12:10 p.m. She will discuss her current exhibition at a gallery talk on Monday, March 16 at 7:30 p.m.


