

Joan Collins, Peter Cushing, Patrick Magee and Ian Hendry star. After a brief intermission, five hotel guests reveal their encounters with death in Roy Ward Baker's *Vault of Horror* (1973-86 min.). Tom Baker, Denholm Elliott, Anna Massey and Terry Thomas star. Producer Milton Subotsky scripted these EC Comics-inspired omnibuses, which are both rated PG. 1:30 p.m.

SINATRA: *History, Identity and Italian-American Culture*. Frank Sinatra's remarkable career took him from the streets of Hoboken to the pinnacle of fame, and signaled an ethnic community's arrival in mainstream society. To the sons and daughters of millions of Italian immigrants, Sinatra epitomized what it meant to be Italian-American in the middle and late 20th century. This collection of essays, written by historians and critics, takes an extended look at Sinatra through the lens of Italian-American culture.
