

The Hermès Quartet performs Haydn, Beethoven and more

On Sunday, February 15 at 3 p.m., the Musical Advisory Council welcomes the Paris-based Hermès Quartet for a stop on their first U.S. tour. Violinists Omer Bouchez and Elise Liu, violist Yung-Hsin Chang, and cellist Anthony Kondo won the 2012 Young Concert Artists International Auditions and made their U.S. debuts to rave reviews at the opening concerts of the Young Concert Artists Series at Carnegie's Zankel Hall, and at the Kennedy Center's Terrace Theater. *The Washington Post* praises their "world-class quartet playing" and says "they will likely take their place among the top quartets of our time."

The Quartet has won acclaim performing at prestigious European festivals, and currently holds the Helen F. Whitaker Chamber Music Chair of YCA and is the Artist in Residence at the Queen Elisabeth Music Chapel in Brussels.



The members met at the Lyon Conservatory and formed the ensemble in 2008 under the tutelage of Zoltan Toth and Reiko Kitahama. They studied at the Berlin University

of the Arts, where they worked with the Artemis Quartet, and are currently studying at the Conservatoire à Rayonnement Régional in Paris with members of the Ysaÿe Quartet.

Heloisa Pomfret presents *The Body as a Reliquary*

Heloisa Pomfret, a Brazilian-American visual artist noted for her wide variety of creations, will be featured in the Main Gallery with *The Body as a Reliquary*, which includes paintings, collages, drawings and ceramics. Heloisa's abstract work involves scratching to remove multiple layers of paint on canvas, reflecting sculptural and psychological influences. The show will run from February 1 through 28.

Heloisa was born in Sao Paulo, Brazil and earned a Master of Arts and Master of Fine Arts in painting and drawing at Wayne State University in Detroit. After her studies she moved to New York and began exhibiting at the G.R. N'Namdi Gallery in New York, Chicago, Detroit and Miami.

For the last several years she has spent the summer working in France and Italy. Currently, she lives

and works near Detroit, Michigan, where she is exploring ceramics and alternative materials.

On April 7, visit the Library between the hours of noon and 9 p.m. to register. If you are a registered voter, it is not necessary to register again for our election.

When coming to register, please bring one of the following: a valid photo ID, current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government check, or some other government document that shows your name or address.

The voter registration books will be available as of April 2 for anyone who wishes to confirm that they are a registered voter.

As a matter of information, any resident of the Port Washington school district can also register at the school administration building on Campus Drive on any day the school is open, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

To vote you must be 18 years of age, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the Port Washington Union Free School District for at least 30 days.

A trip to the South Fork for art, food and wine

Registration begins Tuesday, February 3 at 9 a.m. for our May bus trip to the South Fork.

On Wednesday, May 20, our cozy coach will depart the Library at 9 a.m. and head east for a visit to the Parrish Museum. The critically acclaimed Herzog & de Meuron-designed building opened to the public in November 2012. Sited on fourteen acres of meadow in Water Mill, New York, the architecture and landscape honor the East End's natural environment and provide a new way to experience art with a sense of place afforded by no other museum.

We will have a docent-led tour of the current exhibit, *Chuck Close Photographs*. This comprehensive survey explores how Chuck Close—one of the most important figures in contemporary art—has stretched the boundaries of photographic means, methods and approaches. The photographic origin of each Close painting is well known; however, his exploration of the medium extends far beyond the use of photographs as a programmatic tool. For the first time in his extensive exhibition history, this project delves into the full range of his photographic works,



presenting more than 125 images spanning 1968 to the present, ranging from straightforward black and white portraits to monumentally scaled, composite Polaroids to intimately scaled daguerreotypes. The exhibit runs through July 26, 2015.

Following the tour, we'll enjoy

lunch on site in the Golden Pear Café, featuring a selection of salads, sandwiches, desserts and beverages. Afterwards, we'll go next door to Duckwalk Vineyards and sample several offerings. In 1994, this Normandy Chateau-style building in Water Mill, a true Hamptons

landmark, became home to what has quickly evolved into one of the most well-known names in Long Island wine. Then back on our coach for a relaxed journey back to the library.

The Inevitable Defeat of Mister & Pete (2013). Two inner city boys—13-year-old Mister and 9-year-old Pete—are left to fend for themselves over the summer after their mothers are taken away by the authorities.

Kings of Summer (2013). Three teenage friends, in the ultimate act of independence, decide to spend

their summer building a house in the woods and living off the land.



Nasha (2013). An 18-year-old Indian boy falls in love with his 25-year-old drama teacher.

The Spectacular Now (2013). An unlikely romance develops between Sutter and Aimee, the girl next door. Adapted from Tim Tharp's novel.

Warm Bodies (2013). After an introspective teenaged zombie named R saves Julie from an attack, the two form an unlikely romantic relationship. From Isaac Marion's novel.

The Way Way Back (2013). Shy 14-year-old Duncan goes on summer vacation with his mother, her overbearing boyfriend and her boyfriend's daughter. Duncan finds an unexpected friend in Owen, manager of the Water Wizz water park.

Love in the Time of Cholera by Gabriel Garcia Marquez (1988). The intertwined stories of a woman, her husband, and a man who has loved her for nearly 50 years.

Me Before You by Jojo Moyes (2012). After a motorcycle accident nearly takes his life, Will is wheelchair bound and depressed until Louisa, his assistant, shows him that his life is worth living.
